

Located next to:


- State's largest trash incinerator

Why EmpowerED?



NEED TO CHANGE

City's history of corruption, environmental racism, and disinvestment in BIPOC neighborhoods has led to culture of distrust

Power imbalances, lack of authentic community engagement

Bridgeport residents experience the effects of climate change first — and benefit last.

Building leadership, collaboration, knowledge, and skills that are shaping and leading local climate and environmental justice efforts.








Evaluating EmpowerED



Trust and relationships are strengthening in EmpowerED community

Residents' climate vocabulary is increasing in sophistication

Residents articulate why climate action is important to them personally

Residents regularly make connections between their lived experiences and climate science

What Participants Are Learning



We connect climate justice to daily lived experience:

- Heat islands → high summer electric bills & impact on public spaces
 Poor air quality → asthma triggers
- Waste and recycling → pollution & connection to nature
- Transportation emissions → major traffic corridors next to homes
- Renewable energy → energy costs and transmission

Skill areas:

- Technology & digital literacy
- Research & data collection
- Critical thinking & advocacy

Residents learn not just what's happening, but why and what they can do.

What's Next

- Curriculum is being co-designed with residents
- Monthly sessions serve as pilots to test training content
- The curriculum will reflect participants' insights, needs, and leadership
- Goal: create a model that can be replicated in other frontline communities across CT
